English writer, J.R.R Tolkien was a frequent visitor to the Forest of Dean. Puzzlewood is said to have provided his inspiration for the forests of Middle Earth in his famous Lord of the Rings trilogy.

Joseph Mallord William Turner was an English painter, considered a controversial figure by some. Turner's early work includes traditional paintings of English landscapes including Tintern Abbey in Monmouthshire.

J.K. Rowling, author of the Harry Potter books, grew up in Tutshill, nr Chepstow and attended Wyedean Comprehensive School, where she frequently told stories to her fellow students.

Frank Oz, well known for voicing the wise Yoda in the Star Wars franchise, was born in Hereford.

Dennis Potter, doyen of TV playwrights, was born in Berry Hill in the Forest of Dean, which had a profound effect on his work.
